Over the past year, Inclusive Arts Vermont has touched the lives of nearly 4,500 Vermonters.

During the 2018-19 year we:

- Trained 28 early childhood educators in accessible arts-based literacy, and brought the magic of exploration and creativity to the 212 children in their care.
- Brought teaching artists into 19 K-12 classrooms.
- Engaged 133 adults with disabilities in arts education classes.
- Trained more than 500 staff of museums, universities, schools, and arts non-profits across the state in disability awareness and best practices for accessibility.
- Welcomed thousands to exhibitions in a variety of public exhibitions across the state.
